## Islam: A Religion of Peace

Islam, at its core, is a faith centered on peace, harmony, and compassion. The word Islam itself is derived from the Arabic root "Salam," meaning peace, security, and safety. This reflects the faith's foundational principles of submitting to God and fostering a peaceful existence. Muslims greet one another with the phrase "As-Salam Alaikum" (Peace be upon you), reinforcing the importance of peace in their daily interactions.

Islam envisions a society where justice, equality, and mutual respect thrive. The Qur'an states:

"O People, We created you from a male and a female, and made you into nations and tribes so that you may know one another. The best among you in the eyes of God is the most righteous" (Qur'an 49:13).

This verse underscores the equality of all humans, regardless of race, gender, or ethnicity, highlighting that righteousness is the true measure of a person's worth. Islam advocates for universal brotherhood and calls for mutual understanding and respect among all people.

## The Message of Peace and Tolerance

The Qur'an emphasizes peace as the default state of human relations. Muslims are instructed to resolve conflicts with kindness and fairness, avoiding oppression or aggression. As the Qur'an teaches:

"And do not aggress; God dislikes the aggressors" (Qur'an 5:87).

The Qur'an commands:

*"Repel evil with what is better, and you will see that the one you had mutual enmity with will become a close friend"* (Qur'an 41:34).

Forgiveness is a virtue that is highly valued in Islam. Allah said "Show forgiveness, enjoin what is good, and turn away from the ignorant" (Qur'an 7:199).

Prophet Muhammad emphasized that good character, trustworthiness, and compassion are the marks of a true believer. He stated, "The best among you are those who are kindest to others" (Al-Bukhari).

## The Sanctity of Life and Social Harmony

Islam holds the sanctity of human life in the highest regard. The Qur'an equates the saving of one life to saving all of humanity:

"Whoever kills a soul unjustly, it is as if they have killed all of humanity. Whoever saves a soul, it is as if they have saved all of humanity" (Qur'an 5:32).

This principle is universal, extending to people of all faiths and backgrounds. Islam strictly forbids the taking of innocent lives and advocates for peaceful coexistence. The Qur'an warns against corruption and violence, urging Muslims to be peacemakers and to build a just and harmonious society.

Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) said:

"A Muslim is one from whose hand and tongue people are safe. A believer is one from whom others know their lives and property are secure" (Al-Bukhari).
